Connecting people to place. There's no better way to understand our connection to the land than by spending time outside. Dedicated volunteers led more than 100 free, guided walks and hikes this year to do just that. They helped share the wonder and joy of birds, wildflowers, geology, and more with hundreds of people both young and young at heart. The Land Trust also embarked on a new effort to develop a community vision for Skyline Forest. Together with a coalition of community groups, we are working to create a robust, community-wide effort that engages local organizations, leaders, and community members in creating a shared vision for Skyline Forest's future conservation and management. Our hope is that this effort will help lead to a permanent conservation solution for Skyline Forest that connects our community to Skyline for years to come.



Taking cues from nature's ultimate engineer, the crafty beaver, we kickstarted the Willow Springs Preserve restoration with a low-tech restoration approach. Crews built more than 130 wooden structures by hand to help restore habitat in and along Whychus Creek. The goal of this kind of low-tech restoration is to let the creek and its natural processes lead. Over time, with the addition of high flows, the log structures throughout the restoration will jumpstart these processes which will change the creek and build much better habitat for fish and wildlife.
